### Congrats, Our Archbishop Of West Africa

The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad.—The Psalms.

The most joyous day of the year for the people of Nigeria had also been celebrated by African-wide that God Himself—the justifier before the world—the Divine Ambassador of the Nigerian People who would be the first Archbishop of the new Diocese of West Africa of the American Commission.

The witness have now been granted in real fulfillment for the inauguration of the Diocese on Tuesday, April 17, 1951, by His Grace Dr. Geoffrey F. His Co-Consecrator under the auspices of the Archbishop of the scene of the emotional ceremony, by the way, was the representative presence of the Chief and this “little” drew from the side, while only have been very remarkably successful in setting spectators in viewing, leaving in order of lines beyond the grandeur, solemnity, importance and very joyously as usual in such an occasion, greeted as a miracle in the world.

The choice of location had also its official importance beyond the religious—religious and ceremonial—acknowledged from all quarters, far and near. The crowd and the scholars of my fellow Nigerians who are exceedingly proud and happy at what is being celebrated are always present, happy, respectful, and warm-hearted people who are always very friendly and helpful.

### REGRO PRECINCTORS ON: 'The Present World Situation'

At a lecture given to the Lagos University recently by Lt. Colonel F. Thors the Regional Public Relation Officer, the Regro gave his personal views on the present world situation.

A large number of the people who attended this lecture had had for thought and agreed with every word of the lecturer. The lecturer's point of view dealt with by the lecturer was the world food shortage, which he explained was due to increase in birth and less agricultural production. About the question of the third world war, the lecturer said he did not believe that this was inevitable, and said further that it would be a matter of the greatest magnitude, and might wreck our present civilization.

### Kalabari People Fined £20,000 under Collective Punishment Ordinance

#### GOVT. ISSUES RELEASES.

WHEREAS on the 25th day of January, 1951, it was ordered that an inquiry be held for the purpose of the said Ordinance to ascertain what occurred at Okoboko in the Division of Rivers Province on the 4th and 5th days of August, 1950, and whether all or any inhabitants of any village or cluster of members of any tribe or community have suppressed evidence in any criminal case, investigation, or inquiry, and whether their conduct has been such as to require the bringing of police to any village or district in the employment of police against them for the purpose of preventing or suppressing disturbances or enforcing lawful orders;

AND WHEREAS the inquiry has been duly held;

AND WHEREAS the Governor, upon consideration of the evidence taken at the said inquiry and the reports upon that evidence made by the officers who conducted the said inquiry, find that members of the Igbas, Akawas, Nibakas and Tonsu's communities of the Kalabari Okas have suppressed evidence in the investigation of a large number of cases of alleged murders which occurred at Okokoro, Okofor and on the 4th and 5th days of August, 1950, and in that the conduct of members of the communities aforesaid has been such as to require the bringing of police to the district and the employment of police against members of the said communities for the purpose of prevention of disturbances;

NOW THEREFORE, in exercise of the powers conferred upon the Governor by section 3 of the Collective Punishment Ordinance, 1951, I hereby order as hereby made:

**SHORT TITLE**

This order may be cited as the Collective Punishment Ordinance, 1951.

**FINE ON THE KALABARI**

It is hereby ordered that—

(a) a fine of twenty thousand pounds be imposed on all inhabitant towns of Igbas, Akawas, Nibakas and Tonsu and associated villages; and

(b) the said fine shall be apportioned among the persons in whom it is imposed in such manner as the Resident Rivers Province shall direct; and

(c) the date fixed for payment of the said fine may be the twenty day of May, 1951; and

(d) the sum of twenty thousand pounds part of the said fine shall be applied in such manner as the Resident Rivers Province, in its direct or independent, for having caused by way of offence to which the said level penalties relates.

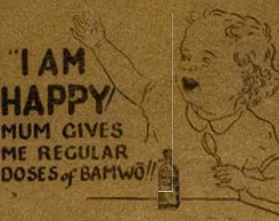

BALTIMORE, Maryland—An editorial in the "Baltimore Sun" has rallied the members of a local Negro National Guard unit, the 231st transportation Truck Battalion, who have been ordered to report for active duty in Korea.

**Nigeria's New Constitution**

An Order to Council, known as the Nigeria (Electoral Provisions) Order, 1951, was made on 15th May, April 3, 1951, empowering the Governor of Nigeria to make regulations for the House of Assembly which is set to be elected by the three regions of Nigeria.

The Order will enable a reorganisation of electors to take place.

The new constitutional proposals for Nigeria, which are set to be passed by the House of Commons, will be a landmark in the history of the country.
