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STREET LIGHTING.

AT its present rate of development, Ibadan is badly in need of street lighting. Its huge population, numbering 800,000, is steadily increasing. The volume of trading activities inside the town is fast extending to every town in Nigeria and new motor lorries are being purchased every fortnight almost along with this rapid development is the daily influx of strangers who, coming in search of employment and trade, eventually settle down for good so that, the town is expanding more and more.

The prevailing darkness of the unlighted streets and thoroughfares in the town is a great opportunity to those bad characters that are always present in every community, to ply their trade. Who can ever thought of moving about in such dark nights as we had been experiencing recently? But with properly lighted streets the case would be different.

The recent wounding of a policeman by a band of robbers is an illustration of the case in point. It is certain that such a thing could not be possible with lighted streets and continuous streams of people going about their business at all hours of the night.

According to the official reply to the Hon. R. Irving the Commercial Member for the Colony Division at the last Legislative Council session that some £70 000

would be expended upon Electric Lighting of Ibadan, we confidently hope the authorities will not long delay this much needed improvement.

Abeokuta.

Abeokuta, a town of British West Africa in the Egba division of the Yoruba country S. Nigeria Protectorate. It is situated in 7° 8' N., 3° 25' E., on the Ogun river, 61 m N. of Lagos by railway or 81 m by water. Population, approximately 60,000. Abeokuta lies in a beautiful and fertile country, the surface of which is broken by masses of grey granite. It is spread over an extensive area, being surrounded by mud walls 18 miles in extent. Abeokuta under the reforming zeal of its native rulers, was largely transformed during the early years of the 20th century. Law courts, government offices, prisons, and a substantial bridge were built, good roads made, and a large staff of sanitary inspectors appointed. The streets are generally narrow and the houses built of mud. There are numerous markets in which a considerable trade is done in native products and articles of European manufacture. Palm oil, timber, rubber, yams and shea-butter are the chief articles of trade. An official newspaper is published in the Yoruba and English languages. Abeokuta is the headquarters of the Yoruba branch of the Church Missionary Society and British and American missionaries have met with some success in their civilizing work. In their schools about 2000 children are educated. The completion in 1890 of a railway from Lagos helped not only to develop trade but to strengthen generally the influence of the whiteman.

Abeokuta word meaning "under the rock" arising from 1825, owes its origin to the incessant inroads of slave-hunters from Dahomey and Ibadan which compelled the village populations scattered over the open country to take refuge in this rocky stronghold against the common enemy. Here they constituted themselves a free confederacy of many distinct tribal groups, each preserving the traditional customs, religious rites and even the very names of their original villages.

Yet this apparently incoherent aggregate held its ground successfully against powerful armies often sent against the

place both by the King of Dahomey from the West and by the people of Ibadan from the north-east. The district of Egba of which Abeokuta is the capital has an area of 3,000 sq. m. and a population of 55,000. It is officially known as the Abeokuta Province of the Southern Nigeria Protectorate. It contains luxuriant forests of palm trees which constitute the chief wealth of the people. Cotton is indigenous and is grown for export. The Egbas are enthusiastic farmers and have largely adopted European methods of cultivation. They are very tenacious of their independence, but accepted without opposition the establishment of a British protectorate, which, while putting a stop to inter-tribal warfare, slave-raiding and human sacrifices, and exercising control over the working of laws, left to the people executive and fiscal autonomy. The administration is in the hands of a council of chiefs which exercises legislative, executive and to some extent judicial functions.

The President of the Council or ruling chief chosen from among the members of the two recognized reigning families is called the Alake, a word meaning "Lord of Ake;" Ake being the name of the principal quarter of Abeokuta after the ancient capital of the Egbas.

The Alake exercises little authority apart from his council the form of government being largely democratic. Revenue is chiefly derived from tolls or import duties. A visit of the Alake to England in 1904 evoked considerable public interest. The chief was a man of great intelligence, eager to study western civilization and an ardent agriculturist.

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News & Notes.

The complaint is general among the residents on this side of the town comprising Eketedo, Moosafojo, Dugbe, Ghogi, Oganpu, Abebi,—that the water from the only stand-pipe erected at Eketedo is not always clear, it often resembles the colour of a weak Tea, *Ajibò* or lemonade, with occasional trace of swampy scent.

As a large number of people—about 8,000—are daily using the water from this one pipe, we trust the authorities will have a look in and apply the necessary remedies to make the supply of water quite safe for drinking, baking and cooking purposes.

Dysentery has been raging in town recently and several sufferers have succumbed to the malady.

The Health Officers have been very busy inspecting the compounds and yards lately. We trust they will direct the attention of owners of the numerous disease breeding water holes and cess-pits—termed "wells"—all over the town, as to improve them by deepening and have them properly covered, or in default to close up such pits altogether.

The Administration is constructing the draiq in front of the Roman Catholic Sisters' Convent at Idikan Street. This will do away with the pool of stagnant water always clogging the natural drain in front of their school-room. We hope the authorities will soon take up the work of improving this important motor road by continuing the drainage system right up to the upper junction of the road at Yeosa.

The volume of water passing through at every rain fall is so great that a gang of workmen is always detailed to mend the earthwork washouts fortnightly almost. This constant repairs and expense might be avoided by the construction of proper drains on each side of the road.

We understand an Official Residence for the Duke of Ibadan is to be built near the new Council Hall at Oge Maps and that the foundation of the building will be laid in course of this year.

The First Anniversary of the local Order of Cherubim will be celebrated next Sunday when the members of the order will hold a Thanksgiving Service at Jehovah Nissi, U.N.A., Church, Idikan, at 3 p.m.
